


Nursery Recommended Reads


Cows in the Kitchen By June Crebbin

The prehistoric creatures which fascinate children so much loom large in these pages.




Dogs By Emily Gravett

The world's best-known lift-the-flap book with many sequels and associated games and toys.




Zoe and her Zebra By Clare Beaton

An alphabet book in which each felt collage illustration shows a child whose name begins with a certain letter being chased by an animal whose name begins with the same letter.




Five Little Ducks By Ian Beck

In this story in which repetition is used to humorous effect, two delightful ducklings go everywhere together.




Handa's Surprise By Eileen Browne

Handa sets off to visit her friend Akeyo with a wonderful array of fruit in a basket on her head.




Here We Go Round the Mulberry Bush By Sophie Fatus

An interactive version of the traditional counting down rhyme.




There's a Cow in the Cabbage Patch By Stella Blackstone
